

Normal order for obtaining signatures for Eagle project proposal.

1) The Scout has had discussions with Scoutmaster and beneficiary about the project. When beneficiary and Scoutmaster consider the plan acceptable for an eagle project, they sign it along with committee chair. These signatures are on "Proposal Page E" and show that they all approve the project as written. At this time the scout must also sign on the same page indicating the Scout has read the entire workbook. Not all of the workbook may be understood by the Scout at this time.

2) At the same time as the eagle project plan is being readied, the Scout should fill out "Fundraising Application Page A". The "Fundraising Application Page A" is required if Scout is obtaining funds other than through donations.

3) Next the Scout contacts the district representative for a review of the eagle project proposal. For this review the Scout must bring

a) A printout of the **entire** eagle project workbook with all signatures obtained on "Proposal Page E" except for Council or District Approval signatures.

b) If any signatures are missing, the review meeting is stopped. The Scout must obtain the approval signatures and again schedule a review meeting.
